## Variety Show

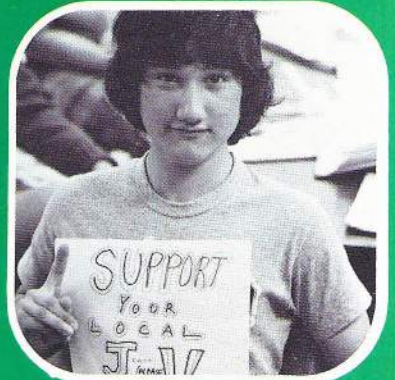
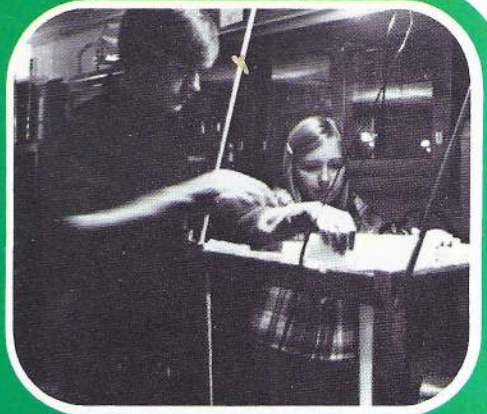

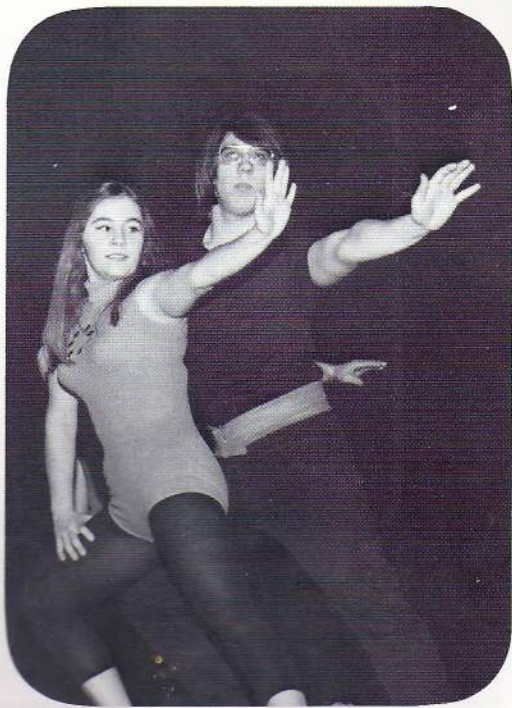
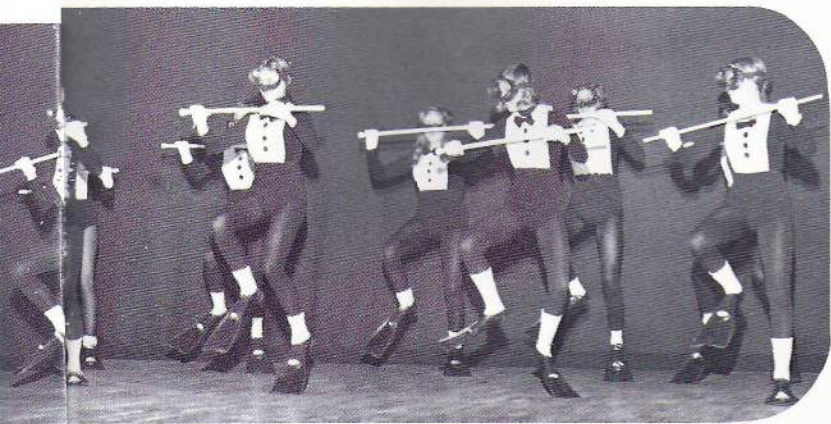


## Eye Of The Needle

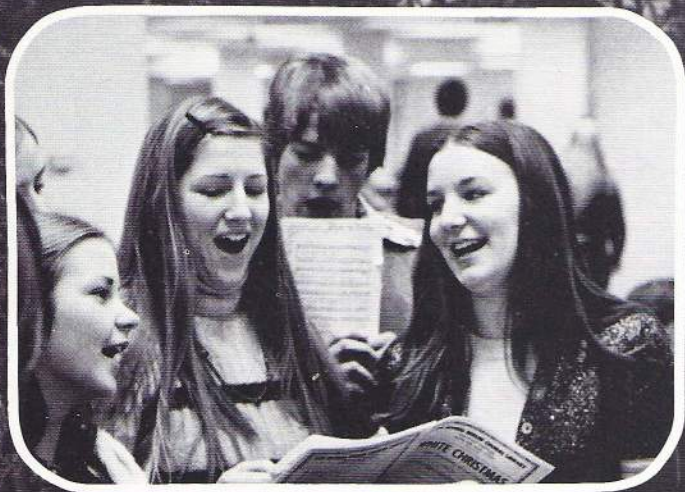
